SLAM THE SCAM WITH SOCIAL SECURITY

The Social Security Administration and its Office of the Inspector General (OIG) continued to raise public awareness about Social Security imposter scams during the fourth annual "Slam the Scam" Day held in March. Social Security scams — where fraudsters pressure victims into making cash or gift card payments to fix alleged Social Security number problems or to avoid arrest – are an ongoing government imposter fraud scheme. For several years, Social Security impersonation scams have been one of the most common government imposter scams reported to the Federal Trade Commission. We've made concerted efforts to address this issue, through extensive outreach and investigative initiatives. These efforts have made a significant impact, reducing money reported lost to Social Security scams by 30 percent from 2021 to 2022.

"I am proud of the work we have done to combat Social Security imposter scams and raise public awareness," said Kilolo Kijakazi, Acting Commissioner of Social Security. "We will continue to use every tool at our disposal to protect the public and their critical benefits. We urge Americans to remain vigilant, do not give out personal information or money, and report any scam attempts."



Scammers use sophisticated tactics to trick potential victims into disclosing personal and financial information.

Typically, they use the five P's – Pretend, Prize or Problem, Pressure, and Payment. For example, scammers pretend they are from Social Security in phone calls or emails and claim there is a problem with the person's Social Security number. The scammer's caller ID may be spoofed to look like a legitimate government number.

Scammers may also send fake documents to pressure people into complying with demands for information or money. Other common tactics include citing "badge numbers" and using fraudulent Social Security letterhead to target individuals for payment or personal information.

We will never:

- Tell you that your Social Security number is suspended.
- Contact you to demand an immediate payment.
- Threaten you with arrest.
- Ask for your credit or debit card numbers over the phone.
- Request gift cards or cash.
- Promise a Social Security benefit approval or increase in exchange for information or money.



Our employees do contact the public by telephone for business purposes. Ordinarily, we call people who recently applied for benefits, are already receiving payments and require updates to their record or requested a phone call from us. If there is a problem with a person's Social Security number or record, we will mail a letter.

"Working with our law enforcement and private sector partners to inform consumers about scammers and their deceptive practices remains a priority for my office. We will continue promoting National Slam the Scam Day to help protect consumers from these predators. Slamming the scam begins with consumers quickly taking a step to hang up the phone, or delete suspicious texts and emails, without responding to the scammers," said Gail S. Ennis, Inspector General for the Social Security Administration. "That remains the easiest and most effective method to avoid falling prey to these vicious scams."

Memories of Krape's Park

Growing up in Freeport, it was traditional to visit Krape's Park. My earliest memories include taking my little terrier to play on the slides. Nipper would get in line and take a turn along with children. Her ears flying and a grin, down she'd go and head back to the end of the line for another turn.

During winter, signs would go out to alert us that the ice was thick enough to put on our skates in the ice house and go down the wood ramp to glide around, eventually heading towards Twin Caves. There were boys playing ice hockey, and show offs going backwards and spinning, or making whips swinging back and forth quickly enough to shake a few skaters off the line.

During the summer Mom saved up bread and we'd go to the duck pond. Throwing a handful of dried bread would start a quacking and gathering of ducks bobbing for the treat. It never got old watching them jockeying for position to get handouts.

As I got older I'd ride my bicycle from West Jefferson to the park, feeling free with the wind in my hair, and independent on my own. There were wild flowers in the spring and people rowing rental canoes in the summer. Winter brought sleds and toboggans for thrilling rides with friends.

It was tradition to walk up the narrow stone steps along side the waterfall, clutching the heavy chain railing, feeling the mist from the falls when the wind blew. We'd stand on Flagstaff Hill and look down to Yellow Creek, the ducks, the beautiful white bridge, and the totem pole standing just across from the bridge.

On warm summer nights people came to hear musicians playing at the band shell. Families cooked hot dogs and hamburgers on wood fires built in limestone fireplaces stocked with wood provided by the Park District workers. Some men brought their charcoal grills. Picnic tables were full near the old fire truck, swings, and slides. You could stop at the refreshment building for snacks and beverages.

Changes have been made. Miniature golf, a climbing rock and barn for the ducks, as well as disc golf are available. Paddle boats can be rented in the shape of a dragon, swan, and ducks. Pickle ball courts are busy and walking paths with bridges have been added. It's still on top of the list locals are proud to have. Visitors always love a drive through Krape's Park and are impressed with the natural beauty and well maintained grounds. The merry go round has been a favorite for three generations.

I haven't forgotten all the other parks in our district. Bidwell and Knowlton Parks serve their neighborhood children, The Wetland's Preserve offers fishing, Taylor Park has tennis courts and covered picnic areas as well as flat roads for walkers. Oakdale Nature Preserve has a covered picnic shelter, climbing activities, nature paths, and the Tabernacle again in use. Not to forget the wonderful Park Hills Golf Course. Freeport Park District is one of the best parts of living here.
